### OUR MISSION STATEMENT

To provide the people of Nunavik with educational services that will guide and enable all learners to develop the qualities, skills, and abilities they need in order to achieve well-being and self-actualization.



### A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT AND THE DIRECTOR GENERAL

THE 2023–2024 YEAR WAS UNDENIABLY MARKED BY NOVELTY. FROM A NEWLY ELECTED COUNCIL OF COMMISSIONERS TO THE NEGOTIATION OF COLLECTIVE AGREEMENTS, THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW PATHWAYS FOR EDUCATIONAL SUCCESS, AND PUBLIC CONSULTATIONS, IT WAS A YEAR OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGE! HERE ARE SOME HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST YEAR.

### **A NEW COUNCIL**

On December 4, the newly elected commissioners began their 3-year mandate. Within this group, the Executive Committee representatives were chosen, bringing fresh energy, ideas and directions to the Council of Commissioners.

### **DATA-DRIVEN DECISION-MAKING**

The Council of Commissioners quickly prioritized datadriven decision-making, a project initiated in 2023.

The first phase involved implementing a youth sector dashboard. This initial version provided live data on student enrolment, attendance, and school closures. While promising, improvements are needed to ensure data consistency.

The aim is two-fold: to expand data-driven practices across all organizational levels and to provide staff with access to data from multiple dashboards. This data will better support schools and serve the needs of Nunavik communities.

### **NEW PATHWAYS**

To support student success, we also developed new educational pathways. In the youth sector, there are now two options: the Regular Program and the Work-Oriented Training Path (WOTP).

These clearly defined pathways help students and parents better understand each certification's outcomes, making it easier to identify training and career opportunities after graduation from secondary school. The WOTP also expands accreditation options, enabling students to gain qualifications before completing high school, pursuing vocational training, or continuing their education.

### A POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION INSTITUTION IN NUNAVIK?

From October 2023 to March 2024, consultations took place in all 14 Nunavik communities to reflect on a vision for a post-secondary institution based in the region. Discussions focused on its mission, potential programs, operations, and location. Regardless of the chosen model, this initiative marks a significant step toward new opportunities for Nunavimmiut.

### SIVUMUATTIIT

Realizing the importance of holding broader consultations to examine how we ensure student success, we established the foundations of Sivumuattiit. A four-phase strategic planning consultation process, this initiative aims to reimagine ways to support Nunavik students on their paths to success. Insights from the consultations, held within and outside our organization, will guide the strategic plan's development. Phase one is set to begin at the beginning of the 2024–2025 school year.

### UPDATE ON COLLECTIVE AGREEMENTS

In the ongoing negotiations for teachers, support staff and professionals, the limitations of the current legal framework highlight challenges to self-determination in education under the James Bay and Northern Quebec Agreements.

While Kativik Ilisarniliriniq's (KI) demands align with those of unionized employees, decisions remain subject to the Quebec Treasury Board's approval. Additionally, discussions on regional disparities occur without KI's involvement, exacerbating this sense of limitation.

While no agreement has been reached yet, KI's priority is to offer equitable working conditions and benefits to all unionized employees, and we aim to conclude these negotiations promptly.

### **ABOUT US**

Kativik Ilisarniliriniq, the school board of Nunavik, was established following the James Bay and Northern Quebec Agreement (JBNQA) that came into effect on November 11, 1975. Since June 21, 1978, it has been the exclusive provider of educational services to the Nunavik population. Under the JBNQA, the school board is authorized to develop and deliver educational programs and services designed to protect and promote the Inuit language, culture and way of life. Education programs developed by Kativik Ilisarniliriniq are offered in all schools across Nunavik's 14 communities, with Inuktitut as the first language and English and French as second languages. The school board operates 18 primary and secondary schools, along with 6 adult education centres.

Kativik Ilisarniliriniq is governed by the Education Act for Cree, Inuit and Naskapi Native Persons (CQLR c I-14), while the Education Act (CQLR c I-13.3) applies to all non Indigenous school service centres in Quebec.



### **COUNCIL OF COMMISSIONERS** 2023-2026

Comprised of 14 INDIVIDUALS elected by universal suffrage for a 3-year mandate, the Council also includes one appointed Kativik **Regional Government representative.**

### PLANNING INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE

KATIVIK ILISARNILIRINIQ (KI) MANAGES A SUBSTANTIAL NUMBER OF BUILDINGS AND ONGOING CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS (YOUTH SECTOR SCHOOLS, ADULT EDUCATION CENTRES, STUDENT RESIDENCES, WAREHOUSES, ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES, TRANSIT STAFF HOUSING AND PERMANENT STAFF HOUSING). IN JUNE 2024, AN IMPORTANT MILESTONE WAS ACHIEVED TO ENHANCE THE PLANNING OF OUR INFRASTRUCTURES' MAINTENANCE AND RENOVATION, AS WELL AS THE REPLACEMENT OF DILAPIDATED BUILDINGS. In 2021, KI acquired the Maximo software. This computerized maintenance management system (CMMS) facilitates automated workflows and provides an up-to-date inventory of all required maintenance work on our buildings.

Over the last three years, the maintenance needs of all housing units, schools, adult education centres, student residences and warehouses were assessed in the 14 Nunavik communities. Based on the data compiled in Maximo (evaluation reports and pictures), the Material Resources Department was able to confirm an Accumulated Maintenance Deficit (AMD), totalling \$292.4 M at the end of the 2023–2024 school year.

With the funding currently allocated by the MEQ (\$30 M per year for building repairs), it is estimated that it would take 10 years to bring this AMD to zero. This scenario does not take into consideration the repair budget that will also be required to deal with normal wear and tear on all our buildings over this 10-year period.

In the context of global warming, the replacement of pad foundations by piles on new and existing buildings will be implemented in Maximo in 2024–2025. The objective is to prepare for the forecasted receding of permafrost over the next 20 to 30 years, and to verify the current estimate of \$60 M for the work planned.

### INVESTIGATION OF **OUR GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION**


ON JANUARY 3, 2024, THE QUEBEC MINISTRY OF EDUCATION MANDATED ITS DIRECTION GÉNÉRALE DES AFFAIRES **INTERNES TO INVESTIGATE THE GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION** OF KATIVIK ILISARNILIRINIQ (KI). THIS FOLLOWED A DECREE ISSUED BY THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF THE QUEBEC GOVERNMENT ON DECEMBER 20, 2023.

During the following six months, KI collaborated with the investigation team. By the end of June 30, the team had conducted one field visit to Nunavik, Director General Harriet Keleutak welcomed the investigation, saying she believed it would "provide an opportunity for the Quebec government to better understand our needs and the specificities of the environment in which we operate." President Sarah Aloupa emphasized the need for "adequate support from the Quebec Ministry of Education," adding that she was "hopeful that this investigation will help us move forward on several fronts." Among others, providing equal working conditions to all our employees remains a top priority for the Council of Commissioners. In this context, President Sarah Aloupa noted that "our budget rules having expired in June 2023, it will be essential that the new ones reflect our realities, including projected infrastructure and staffing needs."

attended two Council of Commissioners meetings and two meetings of the Ministerial Table referred to as the Inuit Table (a MEQ coordination mechanism created in 2021 following the 2018 Quebec Ombudsman report), interviewed employees, and collected extensive documentation. The final investigation report was still being compiled when the school year ended. By then, one thing was clear for KI's political leadership and senior management alike: they hoped to see more engagement from the MEQ and signs that the realities of Nunavik are well understood. The investigation took place in the context of a cumulative deficit totaling \$28 M, which the Council of Commissioners has argued is a direct result of inadequate MEQ funding and budget rules that expired in June 2023.






